This project had the dual benefit of community involvement and direct advantage to the historic preservation. I have ample experience with the development of heritage preservation management plans. I completed the heritage preservation component of the Integrated Land Management Plans for Britain's Aldershot, Longmoor and Cinque Ports Training Areas.
